
Southern Islands: Kusu Island

Directions:

Depart from One
Degree 15 Marina
(est 15 mins)

Depart from RSYCMarina (est 40 mins)

Berthing/Landing: You can berth at the small jetty or drop anchor in the northern cove. Be careful of receding tides in the cove.

Note:

- Enter the bay/cove only during mid to high tides. During low tides, there is possibility of beaching as the depth is about 1-1.5M
- 2. Do not use the commercial jetty as they are suitable only for bigger boats
- 3. Use the small jetty but be aware of other boats needing to use it

TBSA's Take On The Island

For those seeking a prayerful time on the island, you will need to jostle with the rest of the worshippers during the 9th month of the lunar calendar. At other times of the year, the island is simply tranquil. You have unspoiled beaches to swim and snorkel in and wide expanse of white sands to just relax. Its probably not the most exciting of the southern islands, but the peacefulness will grow on you. Check out the marine walk at low tides at both the lagoons. The city skyline from the island is fantastic.

There are however a few areas you need to take note of:

- 1. Strong currents, need to watch out for swimmers especially the weaker ones
- 2. You can berth at the jetty but only for a short while. Choose the smaller jetty as the larger one is for commercial boats. Beware of rocks near the jetty when you berth
- 3. There is a confluence of currents between Lazarus and Kusu island so drive carefully
- 4. Low tides. The bays are totally drained at low tides. Its important that you understand that when mooring your boat in the bays. Read the tides and get out 3 hours before the lowest tides
- 5. You cannot stay overnight on the island. Get out before it gets dark




Areas to avoid when boating (30 Aug 2020)
