## **Southern Islands: Sisters Island**

Size of Island: 3.9 hectares + 1.7 hectares



**Things to do**: These days, the islands are good for a day of leisurely water activities. Get under the sea in your snorkelling gear and explore hard and soft corals while witnessing giant clams, sea horses, octopuses, and even black-tip reef sharks! A word of caution though - the currents can get really strong so take care not to get washed away.

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## **Getting There**



#### **Directions:**

Depart from One
Degree 15 Marina
(est 15 mins)

Depart from RSYCMarina (est 30 mins)

Berthing/Landing: At eastern cove of the bigger island or western cove of smaller island marked (X)

#### Note:

- 1. Enter the bay/cove only during mid to high tides. During low tides, there is possibility of beaching as the depth is about 1-1.5M
- 2. Do not use the commercial jetties as they are suitable only for bigger boats
- 3. Passengers will need to swim to shore. Not suitable for non-swimmers or elderly

## TBSA's Take On The Island

This is a beautiful island with lush greenery and large bay/beach areas. Fantastic fishing spots, lots of amenities such as toilets, shelters, BBQ pits, excellent walking trails etc. I would recommend this island for families who want to take an afternoon off for some family time away from the hustle and bustle of Singapore and away from crowds of people.

There are however a few areas you need to take note of:

- 1. Strong currents, need to watch out for swimmers especially the weaker ones
- 2. Lack of berthable jetty means that you will need to anchor in the bay, close to shore and swim. Make your passengers know that before you plan that trip. Also, check that you have an anchor ©
- 3. Low tides. Some of the bays are totally drained at low tides. Its important that you understand that when mooring your boat in the bays. Read the tides and get out 3 hours before the lowest tides
- 4. This island is a 30-40 min drive to RSYC. Leave the island early to get back before dark. If you are departing from One Degree, no problem, it'll be a 10 min drive away.
